A Rare Ceylonese Table of Specimen Woods
by the Kandy Industrial School of Sri Lanka

Supported on a turned folding base, the elliptical top having a carved ebony edge, and sixteen different native woods, laid in radials, and identified by the original label underneath.

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Ceylonese furniture produced in the nineteenth century gained recognition and appreciation in

Western Europe with the participation of South Asian furniture makers at the various international exhibitions and world fairs starting with the Great Exhibition of 1851 in London.

The Kandy Industrial School was begun by the Reverend E.E. Taylor, MA in 1854, founded in the capital of the ancient kings' of present-day Sri Lanka.

At the 1886 Colonial and Indian Exhibition, 24 items of Ceylonese furniture were exhibited. The Kandy Industrial School loaned "a small inlaid round table," which may be a reference to the present table. The informative label included on the table also supports it was intended as an exhibition piece.
